Steve Pierce, HDL.com:

Steve Pierce founded HDL in 1987, an Internet and web consultancy founded in Albuquerque, New Mexico. Now living in Ypsilanti, he came to Michigan for true love; his wife moved for a job.

Steve launched Wireless Ypsi in January 2008, a free wifi Internet service in Ypsilanti. Since then, Steve has assisted the City of Dearborn, Lincoln Park, Trenton, Detroit, Windsor, and a number of other communities in deploying similar free wireless networks using the Wireless Ypsi model. Today over 750,000 have used free Internet networks Steve helped design and install.

Voice over IP (VOIP) Technology: Is it right for your library?

The future of real time communications is evolving away from traditional voice service to VOIP-Based service. There are many options for VOIP service from adoption of end-to-end VOIP service or a partial VOIP-Based service. This session will compare traditional voice services to various commonly deployed VOIP solutions and the advantages, disadvantages and risks associated with VOIP deployment.
