🕅 How Can I Get Involved?

- 1. Complete the online Volunteer Survey by April 15, 2014.
- 2. Select up to three committees or work groups in rank order of priority.
- 3. Consider chairing or vice-chairing a work group and note that on your survey.
- 4. You will be notified of your committee or work group appointment(s) by May 2, 2014. Appointments are for oneand two-year commitments.
- 5. Plan to attend Work Group Development (formerly Leadership Orientation) for all workshop volunteers on Friday, June 20, 2014 at the Hannah Community Center in East Lansing.
- 6. Committees and work groups will establish their regular meeting schedules after Work Group Development.

Who is Eligible?

All MLA members are eligible to participate and volunteer on a committee or work group. Nonmembers interested in volunteering are welcome to join the association by visiting our website or calling (517) 394-2774 ext. 211.

The volunteer make up will be representative of the MLA membership. Consideration will be given to diversity in terms of job category, geography and type and size of library. All library staff are welcome and encouraged to join and participate.

\mathfrak{V} What Is Expected of Me?

Committees and work groups will meet as needed to accomplish their objectives. Work groups planning for 2015 workshops will focus on developing quality content and speaker selection. They will complete their work from August through December. Standing committees will generally meet once a month.

Volunteers are expected to attend scheduled meetings including any event or activity they help organize, miss no more than three meetings in one year, contact their chair if they are unable to attend and complete assignments or projects assigned to them in accordance with the overall MLA strategic plan. More information will be provided in the appointment letter and at Work Group Development or at initial meetings for those volunteers participating on standing committees and award work groups.

♥ MLA Standing Committees

Legislative Committee

Monitors legislative and policy issues impacting libraries and makes policy recommendations to the board. Informs and educates members about state legislation and policy issues of interest to the membership. Works closely with MLA lobbyists. Communicates with legislators and other elected officials as needed.

Desirable skills: Strong oral and written communication; high interest in advocacy

Membership and Communications Committee

Lead efforts to contact non-renewals as well as new and prospective members. Add value to the MLA e-newsletter through member-driven content as well as support the social media initiatives of the association.

Desirable skills: Interpersonal communication; public relations; strong writing skills; social media savvy; ability to plan and meet deadlines.





Professional Development and Networking Committee

Works with MLA staff to develop conferences, workshops and events. Helps coordinate workgroups to see all deadlines are met and events are fulfilling their specified goals. Considers membership target markets, survey results, trends and the educational needs and direction of the library community to offer programming recommendations. Anticipates emerging trends and hot topics. Members must have prior experience on an MLA work group to participate on this committee.

Desirable skills: Organization and management skills, ability to plan and meet deadlines; vision, innovation.

Business, Marketing and Management Success (April 24, 2015)

Is facilities management, human resources, logistics or marketing part of your job description? 🕅 Awards Work Groups

Michigan Author Award

The Michigan Author Award recognizes the work of a current Michigan resident or author whose works are identified with Michigan because of subject. The work group will convene in-person and online as needed from December through May to help solicit nominations, review candidates, familiarize themselves with the authors' works and select a winner.

MLA Awards

Help select the winners of the MLA Awards including MLA Librarian of the Year and MLA Heart of a Champion. Also select the recipient of the Frances H. Pletz Award for Excellence in Service to Youth, recognizing a MLA member who has made an outstanding contribution to effective and improved library service to youth through library service and leadership. The work group meets online and in-person on an as-needed basis during the summer and winter months to review applications and select award winners.

Mitten Award

The Mitten Award recognizes one children's picture book published in the calendar year that captures the attention of Michigan librarians. The work group will meet online and in-person from May through February to read and review eligible nominations before selecting the winning and honor books.

YouPer (Young Person) Award - NEW

The YouPer Award recognizes one children's chapter book published in the calendar year that captures the attention of Michigan librarians. The work group will meet online and in-person from May through February to read and review eligible nominations before selecting the winning and honor books.

Thumbs Up! Award

The Thumbs Up! Award recognizes excellence in the genre of teen literature published in the calendar year. The work group will meet online and in-person from May through February to read and review eligible nominations. Following an online teen vote (March – May), the workgroup will reconvene to determine the winning and honor books.

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
