This newsletter is written for the 10 Preschool Development Grant (PDG) Hubs across Michigan. The B-5 Literacy Support Network Hubs were established to support communities across Michigan so that children, families, and educators can have equitable access to materials, training, and other supports for the development of literacy. LETRS Training Grant Opportunity for Pre-K to Grade 3 Educators

The Michigan Department of Education (MDE) is sharing a professional learning opportunity from section 35a(10) for Language Essentials for Teachers of Reading and Spelling (LETRS) training grant. This grant is included in section 35a of the state school aid act enacted under Public Act 48 of 2021. This training grant supports the second guiding principle and the second goal of Michigan's Top 10 Strategic Education Plan.

During LETRS training, educators will explore the science of reading and experience deep learning around language acquisition and evidence-based reading instruction to accelerate learning outcomes. All PreK-Grade 3 educators employed by a public school district in Michigan are encouraged to register. Priority will be given to Pre-K–1 teachers. Don't miss this free opportunity!

PreK educators who are employed by a public school district or is paid with state funds (GSRP) are eligible to participate. <u>Registration</u> for Cohort 3 opened January 29th. The deadline to apply **is August 5th** (unless all available spots are filled before that date) with a start date of September **2022.** For more information, including the <u>frequently asked questions (FAQs) document</u> and the <u>informational webinar recording</u>, please visit the <u>Lexia Learning Michigan LETRS website</u>. - Michigan eLibrary (MeL): a state-wide service of the Library of Michigan that provides all Michigan residence with free access to online full-text books and library materials, including early literacy resources for <u>families</u> and kids!
- Michigan Library Association: a collaborative network of libraries, library professionals, and supports to promote libraries in Michigan. How can your local libraries get involved?
- <u>Storyline Online</u>: a non-profit platform for caregivers and educators to access free virtual read alouds for children.
- MI Kids Matter: a community for caregivers that provides information, resources, and programs to support development of children age birth to 5 years.

Hub Highlights

Hub 4: The second One County One Book (OCOB) was just launched in Kent County! OCOB is a county-wide campaign that encourages the entire community to read to young children.

The first launch was almost two years ago during the start of COVID. The selected book was The Gruffalo. After the book and tool kits were distributed, a watch party of the First Lady Michelle Obama reading The Gruffalo live, was hosted for the community!

This year, the book, The Caring Me I Want to Be was chosen because of the rhyming, diverse characters, the emotion vocabulary introduced, the included prompts for brainstorming of emotions, and opportunity for children to problem solve and connect the text to real life situations.



Kent County adopted the <u>Success Basics</u> which are 5 simple messages that parents can do with their children that is evidenced based with will lead to greater outcomes in life.

The initiative has distributed nearly 9000 Books, 9000 Reading Strategy Kits, 9000 Calendars with activities for families and nearly 7000 digital parent coaches. Community partners (i.e., Head Start For Kent County, Great Start Readiness Program, Early Learning Neighbourhood Collaborative, Grand Rapids Public Library, Kent District Library, Great Start To Quality, Grand Rapids Children's Museum and many more) were essential in the distribution of the books.

Essential Instructional Practices in Early Literacy

Michigan Association of Intermediate School Administrators (MAISA) developed a small set of researchsupported instructional practices called the Essential Instructional Practices in Early Literacy for prekindergarten and grades K-3 to support student early literacy development. **All educators in Michigan have Free access to modules on the prekindergarten and K-3 Essential Instructional Practices in Early Literacy.** The modules were designed in partnership with Michigan Virtual to support the professional development of educators in areas of literacy instruction through the presentation and video presented in the modules.
